

WEALTH IS LOVING ?

You may think that we're going to get all gooey here when we talk about loving. We are not. Loving's not gooey. Loving is hard work.

Loving is not just a feeling - something we "fall into." Loving is a choice. We must choose - sometimes against seemingly impossible odds, with enormous evidence to the contrary - to love whatever we encounter.

First, we must learn to love ourselves.

Heavens, is that difficult? Only we know all the nasty things we've done and all the wicked things we've thought. Only we know how often we've failed and how often we've done the right appearing thing for the wrong reason. And knowing all this, we are asked to love ourselves?



Yes. We wish we knew an alternative, but we don't. Loving ourselves is the only real foundation we've found for loving everyone and everything else in the world.

The good news. course, is that we also know all the goodness within us; all the kind thoughts we've thought, the compassionate things we've done, all the caring feelings we've had.

Like life, we are collections of both good



and bad. Like happiness, loving is choosing to focus on the good. From the challenge of loving ourselves, it's relatively easy to move on to the challenge of loving everyone and everything else.

Do we have to love everyone and everything? No, only what's in front of us. If there's something we don't love, and can't seem to find anything positive about it to focus on, we can simply move away from it and place



ourselves with something we can love. If we are thinking about something, and can't find anything to love about it, we can think about something else, something we can love

Why do we practice loving? Is it for the person or thing we love? Oh, a little. Is it for ourselves? Absolutely. As La Rochefoucauld put it, "The pleasure of love is in loving; we are happier in the passion we feel than in what we inspire." And as another poet wrote, "The love I give you is secondhand. I feel it first." Or, another: "What do I get from loving you? Loving. You."

Our loving, of course, is not just for people. "I love it, I love it; and who shall dare," wrote Eliza Cook, "To chide me for loving that old armchair?" Loving things feels good, and there are a great many things these days in need of our loving. The planet Earth, for example.

"Thank God," wrote Thoreau, "men cannot fly, and lay waste the sky as well as the earth."

The loving we are talking about expects nothing in return. The joy of loving is a reward in itself. "To love for the sake of being loved is human," said Alphonse de Lamartine, "but to love for the sake of loving is angelic."

So, be angelic. Sure it's hard work. The habit of loving only a few selected things and people is strong, but habits can be broken, and new behaviors learned. Let them say of you, as John Dryden said in 1680, "Large was his wealth, but larger was his heart."

More important, learn to say that of yourself long before anyone writes your epitaph.
