A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR DANI:

Gratitude. It's not something I've thought a lot about in recent days.

I have not felt as cheery as usual since I learned we had to cancel all in-person worship and events. And that's likely because I'm mostly extroverted. I love being, talking, and laughing with people, which is no surprise to you! But right now, I've struggled to find gratitude in the midst of finding out why we have to keep social distance from one another, why we can't gather with more than ten people at a time, and why we simply can't physically be with each other. So, while I've been spending my time being frustrated with the current state of the pandemic spread, I've challenged myself to find gratitude in simplicity.

I've invited myself to think back to simpler times—times before I had long to-do lists, places and meetings to be--and I've tried to imagine what brought me meaning and purpose during those times. Recently, a friend invited me to be grateful for the simple relationship between my feet and the earth. This relationship, between my feet and the earth, is about balance. The earth and my body are in relationship partially because my feet find grounding in the earth--it's where my feet and the earth meet.

As I was invited to think about the simple nature of standing up and having my feet touch the ground, I thought about how throughout my whole life, I've loved walking around without shoes. I grew up in a household that took off our shoes when we entered our house, and I took that instruction literally as I moved from my childhood home. When I went to college, the chapel became my home. I spent most of my free time there: working as an intern, writing papers for class, and simply being around people. Soon after I became comfortable with the space, I started taking off my shoes when I entered the chapel office. Now that I think about it, my peers probably didn't love that I did this, but I was comfortable-- I felt at home. And I was grateful to have a home.

I did this again when I moved to Texas and found a home in the basement of one of my seminary buildings. I would study there during the late hours of the night and almost always, the security guard who came to lock up the door would find me without my shoes on. I was comfortable; I was home. I was grateful for having a space to call home and a space to feel comfortable. I showed my gratitude by taking off my shoes and feeling the ground underneath my feet. I expressed my thanksgiving for having a space to be myself by liberating my feet from the suffocation of my shoes. I found gratitude in simplicity.

So, these past few days, I'm thinking more about how my feet share my gratitude. It's kind of silly and fairly simple, but it's what brings me joy during these isolating times. What's bringing you joy? Where are you finding gratitude in simplicity? Send me an email, a Facebook message, or a text to let me know where you are finding joy these days. I want to offer you a prayer that helps me find gratitude in simplicity while holding hope that when we leave this time of uncertainty, we will do so as better and more equipped people who do justice, practice loving-kindness, and walk humbly with God:

God of grace,

"When this [time] is over, may we never again take for granted

A handshake with a stranger, full shelves at the store, conversations with neighbors, a crowded theatre, a Friday night out.

The taste of communion, a routine check-up. The school rush each morning, coffee with a friend, the stadium roaring.

Each deep breath. A boring Tuesday. Life itself.

When this [time] ends, may we find that we have become more like the people we wanted to be, we were called to be, we hoped to be.

And may we stay that way better for each other because of the worst."*

May it be so. Amen.

APRIL READING CELEBRATIONS

CHILDREN'S BOOK DAY: In celebration of Hans Christian Andersen's birthday on April 2, Children's Book Day has events worldwide with writing competitions and speaking engagements with famous authors and illustrators. This is a chance to find out about the great works of some unknown children's authors as well.

NATIONAL BOOKMOBILE DAY: Bookmobiles have been instrumental in getting books to people who would otherwise have no way of receiving them. National Bookmobile Day, April 16, is an opportunity for fans of bookmobiles to show their appreciation -- through thanking bookmobile staff, writing a letter or e-mail to their libraries, or voicing their support to community leaders.


