A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR DANI:

I don't know whether to put a question mark or an exclamation point at the end of this statement that I proclaim each January. This year, should I say: "Happy New Year!" Let's hope it gets better than this past year!

Or:

"Happy New Year?" I'm afraid to say It can't get any worse!

In the last year, we've all experienced a tremendous amount of loss. We cancelled plans, stopped hugging, saw each other less, watched loved ones die, stayed home, worked longer and more challenging hours, received the dreaded news that we ourselves or someone we love received a positive test result of COVID-19, and more.

And as we begin to read the news headlines, proclaiming the light at the end of the tunnel is getting bigger and closer with the release of vaccines worldwide, I begin to wonder if we really do have a happy new year ahead of us. Maybe it's the pessimism I've befriended more this year than ever before, but I wonder how we will make this next year a better year.

With the first distribution of vaccines in the US, are we gearing up to return to our pre-pandemic "normal"? Or are we creating a new normal-- a new culture -- where more can thrive than simply survive?

We were already fairly distant before the pandemic. Maybe we would choose the TV or Facebook more often than attending a community gathering because it's easier and more comfortable. Or maybe we would choose to keep the same routine every week, rarely stepping out of our comfort zones to help a neighbor, send an uplifting card, call a friend, or volunteer.

But what if we make this new year happier by taking each other less for granted? Before the pandemic, I took relationships for granted. How often did I hesitate to visit with a stranger, spend time getting to know someone deeper, reach out to a grieving neighbor, volunteer to serve a meal, or call someone on the phone because I knew I would eventually get around to it?

As we begin this new year, it may be up to us to make it a happy new year (with an exclamation point)! And I am sure it is up to us to create a new "normal" rather than returning to a culture of individualism encouraging us to spend less time with others in order to focus more on our own success. In his description of early Christianity, N.T. Wright reminds readers how first and second century Christians cared for one another in pandemics. He writes, "much of what we take for granted in social attitudes now was Christian innovation." Taking care of the poor, creating new medicines, and sharing educational resources were not understood as society's job until Christians, who followed the most beloved servant of all, decided that relationship and basic care for one another was essential for one's mission and witness for Jesus Christ.

In this new and hopefully happier year, may we all choose each other more for the sake of Christ.



As of December 20, our congregation has donated \$3,895.00 for the Caring Hands Food Pantry since the beginning of 2020. On the 5th of May we received **\$20,232** from the Small Business Administration as part of the Covid-19 Stimulus Package. These funds were for the "Paycheck Protection Program" which helps us keep paying our Pastor, Organist, Custodian and Secretary. In order to meet our 2020 budget, we need to average about \$12,480 per month.

Effective December 11th, the Small Business Administration has forgiven the above loan we received on May 5th.

I have submitted my resignation as Financial Secretary effective when my replacement has taken over the duties or no later than December 31, 2021. After nearly 40 years, I feel these duties should be passed to another.
